Segregation in Oak Ridge, Even After Death

We've all heard stories of segregation and its lasting effects on social dynamics and the demographics of wealth.

Sometimes we talk about the psychological effects, too. When I read some of the history of segregation in Oak Ridge, I was dismayed to read that, as recently as the 1950s, even the cemetery was segregated. Our ORUUC history book tells part of the story, and how it intersects with our church.

ORUUC member Robert Officer died in February 1958, and he was refused burial in the Oak Ridge Memorial Park except in the "area reserved for Negroes." His wife, Arizona Officer, asked for the church's help, and Board members interviewed officials of Oak Ridge Memorial Park and learned that the cemetery was indeed segregated. Non-white persons other than Blacks could be buried anywhere in the cemetery, but Black people were restricted to a designated section at the eastern boundary of the cemetery property. This was the practice, even though the Atomic Energy Commission had donated the land

Our board members were told by cemetery managers that they were following the policies of the National Association of Memorial Parks, and that if

to the City for a cemetery.

we were looking for trouble, they would see that we got plenty of it.

ORUUC was not ready to enter a head on fight against entrenched bigotry at this time, but the board found out that churches could reserve tracts for their members, and that they were free to specify who was eligible for burial in their sections. ORUUC took advantage of the cemetery rules to reserve a Unitarian burial section, where no segregation of the deceased would be allowed.

The church publicized the availability of cemetery plots in the Unitarian section of the Oak Ridge Memorial Park regardless of race, color, or creed. Sadly, by that time it was too late for Mrs. Arizona Officer who had buried her husband Robert in Algood, Tennessee, their ancestral home. Our church still owns those plots to this day, and it's a meaningful part of our story.

People study history in order to ponder how great changes have come about, and learn to navigate the momentous changes that face us in our own era. As we learn about the deep wounds of segregation, may we learn to heal from the past indignities that followed people even unto death.



February Split the Plate Offering: Planned Parenthood of Tennessee and North Mississippi

Every Sunday we share our offering 50/50 with a local agency chosen by our members during a vote at the Congregational Meeting each June. This month, the Split the Plate offering goes to Planned Parenthood of Tennessee and North Mississippi.

The first Planned Parenthood chapter in the state was formed in Oak Ridge in 1961, and many of the first volunteers and board members were from ORUUC. This organization provides affordable health and reproductive care to individuals regardless of health insurance,



along with sex education and gender affirming care for transgender people over 18. Following an arson fire that destroyed their Knoxville building in 2022, local staff have continued to provide care via a mobile health unit (an R.V.) Tennessee Legislation of Interest to LGBTQ

Community: What legislation is proposed in this session of the Tennessee Legislature that will affect the LGBTQ community? Gabe Rutan-Ram, Executive Director of ChangeTN, will review bills that have been introduced and suggest ways to interact with state legislators at the February 12 PFLAG meeting. All are welcome to attend the meeting, held this month at the Jewish Congregation of Oak Ridge, 101 W Madison Lane. Come at 6:45 p.m. for a social time; the meeting begins at 7 p.m.

Originally from the North Georgia mountains, Rutan-Ram moved to Knoxville in 2015, shortly after graduating from the University of Georgia with a background in media management. He spent the next five years traveling around Tennessee with a special interest in rural counties. He joined ChangeTN in the fall of 2020 with the goal of giving everyone in Tennessee a voice at the table to move the state forward. The focus of ChangeTN is to assist candidates running for office in Tennessee, from town councils to governor's seat and everything in between and help provide the support they need to win regardless if their district is blue, red, or purple.

Oak Ridge has an active PFLAG group which meets the second Monday of the month, rotating the venue among Oak Ridge faith communities including the First Presbyterian, First United Methodist, United Church - Chapel on the Hill, and Oak Ridge Unitarian Universalist Churches, and the Jewish Congregation of Oak Ridge. PFLAG (formerly known as an acronym for Parents, Families and Friends of Lesbians and Gays) is the United States' largest organization uniting families and allies with people who are lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, or queer (LGBTQ). Its mission is to provide opportunities for dialogue about sexual orientation, gender identities, and to create a society that is healthy and respectful of human diversity.
